ON THE PERSONAL SIDE BY DEBBY ROSKO

Here is a story from John Swyka about his passion of RC cars and racing them. Enjoy!

My interest in RC cars didn't start until the late 80s. My brother Steve, (who was a first-class mechanic among other things), was also an RC airplane enthusiast. Steve wanted me to give flying a try, so we built a trainer plane and took it out to a relative's farm where I had less chance of hitting anything. Steve took the plane up, trimmed it out so it flew straight and handed me the radio. The flight was going well until I was bringing it back towards us, but because I have very little depth perception, I almost flew it straight into us before barrel rolling away. My brother thought that the maneuver was very cool, but I swore it was purely an accident and handed him the radio immediately. My flying experience lasted only a few minutes, and I haven't flown since. Not long after that, I was at my brother's, and he handed me the radio for his RC car and it soon became obvious that I was a natural at the wheel. From the first drive, I had no trouble with the left and right turns no matter if I was driving away or towards myself, which many people struggle with early on.

My wife Traci decided to buy me my first RC car for my birthday that year. It was an entry-level, four-wheel drive $1/10^{th}$ scale buggy that cost her as much as her first real car, (she makes sure I will never forget that). I thought I was just going to have a car that I can beat around with my brother, until the local hobby shop told me about the oval races they host once a month during the summer at a local high school parking lot. Needless to say, I just had to see what this RC racing was all about. So once a month, I would go to these races with my wife, (we weren't married at the time), my brother and some friends that also caught the RC bug. Being that the races were a month apart, you would think we would have plenty of time to prepare well in advance for the next race, but it never worked out that way. More often than not, we would run the cars all month at home and stay up until the early morning hours getting them ready the night before the event, sometimes even painting fresh bodies the night before to enter into the concourse competitions before the race.

After that summer, the hobby shop decided they would rent an old warehouse, put in a clay oval track, and run races weekly. They soon transitioned to an indoor carpet track at the New Castle Square mall. As the tracks were getting more sophisticated, so were the cars. The cars to run on the carpet tracks are more purpose built, flat chassis, rear wheel drive cars made to keep the weight on the left side for better cornering. It was around this time that Traci and I got married and wouldn't you know it, she even let me sneak a day of racing in while we were on our honeymoon in Florida. Isn't she great!


The car in the picture below is the last one I ran in oval races with. This car has a front end that was developed by friends on mine I met when racing in Kennet Square, PA. using a handmade bulkhead, truck arms, mono shock and a sway bar made out of bent piano wire. This front end required very little input in the steering wheel to get around corners quickly and not scrub speed. The body is a Steve Park tribute paint scheme and with the exception of the smaller

manufacturer's decals, the rest is all paint. The body is polycarbonate, (Lexan), and is painted from the inside, so the colors should be laid down from dark to light. This was not an easy paint job, but I'm pretty proud of it.




I raced oval up until the late 90s. That's when all wheel drive touring cars started becoming more popular in this area as well as on-road racing, (lefts and rights instead of a standard oval). Once I got a taste for on-road racing, I rarely ever ran oval races again because I appreciated on-road style of racing so much more. I ran indoor and outdoor touring cars in the Kennet Square area until that track closed around 2010. I also dabbled in $1/10^{th}$ scale nitro touring cars at this track for a couple of years as well, thanks to a friend that had me drive his one time. I raced $1/10^{th}$ scale touring cars until 2021 and had the opportunity to travel around to some bigger events in Maryland, Pennsylvania, New York, and Ohio.

Below is a picture of one of my first $1/10^{th}$ scale on-road electric touring cars with a conventional suspension system. This car ran what we called saddle type NiCad batteries, which consisted of three c-cell rechargeable batteries on each side of the car joined by wires, keeping the weight on the chassis more balanced.



Pictured below is my most current 1/10th scale electric touring car which has rotary style dampers mounted to the lower suspension arms working off a leaf spring instead of a conventional shock absorber. This car also uses a much more powerful 2S Lipo battery and brushless style motor. The center of gravity of this car allows you to drive it so much farther into a corner before lifting off the throttle compared to cars with more conventional suspensions. At a quick glance, this car may look similar to the previous one, but so much has changed over the years. Motors are moved forward so the belts that drive the front and rear differentials are equal lengths, resulting in a better power distribution. Also, the chassis has flex tuning capabilities to adjust to a variety of track conditions.



In early '23, a friend I used to race with in Kennet Square sent out a text, asking a select group of us if we ever considered racing 1/28th scale Mini-z cars. These cars require very little track space, and he had an unused second floor in his office building. The track surface they run on is RCP tiles, (much like exercise tiles). They also require less time for upkeep and maintenance compared to the 1/10th scale touring cars pictured above. We pulled a group of friends together and met at the track almost every Wednesday night to practice, race and have dinner. We started this venture planning to keep things simple, but simple is just not in our nature. Most of us have multiple 1/28th scale cars to run in various classes and we've ventured out to other tracks in the region as well. One of our favorite facilities is Park Lane Hobbies in Pottstown, PA and we are yet again expanding our circle of friends. Just like all the cars before, they never stay in their original form. There's always upgrades available to make these cars faster and handle better. And now with 3D printing becoming more common, not only are there upgrade parts being made on these printers, but there is actually one car that is entirely 3D printed except for the electronics, hardware, springs, and such. Although they are very small in size, (approximately 4" wheelbase), they handle incredibly well and are very tunable for different track conditions.

Below are the four 1/28th scale cars I currently have in my arsenal. From left to right, the first is considered box stock class running on AAA batteries and a brushed motor. Next is my AAA super Stock car which uses a brushless motor. The third car is my favorite which runs on a 2S Lipo battery and a 2500kv brushless motor. The fourth car is the fastest of the four I have, also running on a 2S Lipo battery and a 3500kv brushless motor.



Our grandson has taken a little interest in RC cars, so he and I built his first kit together and trust me, he didn't just sit there and watch. He's practicing with it outside, much like I started with my first car and he's doing very well. He's very eager to take it to the local track that runs indoor off-road racing already!



I've had friends over the years that would stop by to see us race, expecting us to just charge a battery and slap it in the car. They were shocked to see that we're putting these cars on alignment systems, cross weight digital scales and making fine adjustments in between races before we even think about recharging them. Building, modifying, and racing these cars is a blast, but just like any other hobby or even like the First State Mustang and Ford Club, it's also about the friendships that you forge along the way. I've been so fortunate to meet a lot of great people over the 35+ years that I've been in this hobby, (some of them I consider family), and don't know where I would be without this great circle of friends.

Feature Car - Michael Graening - 2021 Mustang Mach 1

I purchased my 2021 Mach 1 in Maine during the COVID shortage, specifically because it did not have an excessive dealer markup. I found the car through internet research, having wanted a Mach 1 since its announcement. I was not living in Maine at the time but sought out the car due to limited availability elsewhere.

My choice of the

Mach 1 is for its versatility. It is suitable for track use, daily errands like groceries, comfortable for road trips, and has an appealing appearance. I considered a convertible or a GT350, but the GT350 was only available with a manual transmission, which I didn't know how to drive and was concerned about damaging an expensive car. I later reflected that, had I



known more about the Tremec manual transmission's user-friendliness, I might have reconsidered.


The modifications to my Mach 1 consist of an H-Pipe, take off wheels which I purchased from a friend, two-piece rotors, a functional shaker hood, new fenders, and extensive suspension upgrades. I also added the handling pack wing and other components to achieve the package I could not originally obtain from the factory.



I have driven the car extensively, including on track. My most enjoyable driving moment was "going into the bus stop at Watkins Glen." The experience was more fun before recent changes to the curbs made it harder to get close, especially with my car's lowered stance. I still enjoyed the track but am more cautious now. The 'bus stop', previously called 'the chicane', at Watkins Glen stands out as a particularly fun driving experience, though recent track changes have altered the dynamics.

The Mach 1 can clear speed bumps if driven slowly, which I always do. The farthest trips taken include to Birmingham for the NCAA show and to Chicago; I am unsure which is farther, but I believe Birmingham is farther south and Chicago farther west. I have plans to drive to Daytona in October, which will be my most southerly trip with the car.





The shaker hood on the Mach 1 is functional, similar to those on 1970s models and the 2003-2004 Mach 1s. The air induction plumbing connecting the shaker to the cold air box is very loose. I attempted to replace the tube, but the new one did not fit properly and caused a kink and a hissing sound, so I removed it. The shaking of the hood is normal and not distracting on track. The plumbing is present but needs to be secured better, possibly with double-sided tape, to improve stability.

I intend to keep his Mach 1. I would consider a future GT350 or GT500 if it is not overly extreme like the Super Snake, and am aware of leaked photos of new models. I hope to get a dedicated track car eventually, considering options such as keeping the Mach 1 as a track car and getting a more comfortable daily driver, buying a cheaper track car like a Miata, or purchasing a new GT500 if affordable. Driving 10,000 miles, with 2,000–3,000 of those being track miles, is not ideal for the long term. I am also considering my future needs as my mentors retire and need for a more practical daily vehicle.



I did not know how to drive a manual transmission. I stalled a manual Mach 1 frequently during the Mach 1 experience in Charlotte, particularly at speeds under five miles an hour, finding clutch control difficult. A Hyundai 5-speed is an easy car to learn on and have considered practicing with video games, though my setup lacks a realistic clutch feel.


